The best rivalry in football didn't disappoint last season with Aub's one-second play to end the game. Aub is 7-2 versus Bama in Tuscaloosa.

2013 Recap

At best, the 2013 Tigers were picked to finish fourth in the SEC West. The expectations were not high in Gus Malzahn's first year as head coach at Auburn. Auburn started off the season with uncertainty at quarterback, receiver, linebacker, and in the secondary and things were still unsettled or from a fan's perspective comfortable after a week one victory over Washington State in which the Tigers gave up 464 yards and 28 first downs. Things began to click in week three as Auburn, led by Nick Marshall, put together a fourth quarter game winning drive to defeat Mississippi State giving the Tigers their first SEC win since Ole Miss in 2011. Auburn then went down to Baton Rouge and played in a monsoon and came up 14 points short to a hot LSU team that has had Auburn's number these past few seasons. After the road loss to LSU, Auburn finished the rest of the regular season unbeaten with road wins against Texas A&M, Arkansas and Tennessee while defeating five ranked teams including an SEC title over fifth ranked Missouri giving the Tigers their second SEC title in four years. Auburn then traveled to California to take on the Heisman Trophy winner Jameis Winston and the top ranked Seminoles. Auburn jumped out to a 21-3 lead but then Florida State went on a 31-10 run to become college football's champion. In 2013, Auburn showed that their time at the bottom of the SEC would not last long as they went from 3-9 to 12-2!

OFFENSIVE POSITION WRITE-UPS


Quarterbacks: For the first time in his coaching tenure, head coach Gus Malzahn will have the luxury of coaching a returning starting quarterback. Last season the Tigers knew how the quarterback situation would shake out but didn't know how long it would take for newcomer Nick Marshall to learn the playbook in only five weeks. Marshall was an allstar JUCO quarterback out of Garden City Community College in Mississippi in which he totaled for 37 touchdowns in 2012. Marshall had steady games to open the season, which was expected. Marshall threw his first touchdown pass in an Auburn uniform in the first quarter to Marcus Davis against Arkansas State. Marshall evolved as a passer throughout the year but his impressive read-option ability is what made him flourish under the unique Malzahn offense. Marshall finished the year passing for 1,976 yards with 14 touchdowns, but the magic came from his running ability as he totaled for 1.068 yards and 12 touchdowns on the ground. Marshall will be on many short lists for the Heisman Trophy. The big armed, and big framed, Jeremy Johnson will back up the senior after showing glimpses of potential in minimal playing time even though starting against Western Carolina when Marshall was nursing a knee (17-21 201 yards 4 TD 1 INT). Johnson should be used more this season in passing situations to help better prepare him for a starting role while also being a key component in this season's offense. Jonathan Wallace (four career starts) will most likely be the reliable third string quarterback being accompanied by an Under Armour All-American (MVP of game) and Elite 11 winner Sean White. I expect Marshall's passing numbers to improve (better completion percentage) while also seeing more of talented sophomore Jeremy Johnson.

Running Backs: Auburn has produced a 1,000-yard rusher now in each of the last five seasons (SEC record). Tre Mason wasn't the sure fired go-to at the beginning of the season. Mason only received 39 carries in the first three games of the season while splitting carries with JUCO transfer Cameron Artis-Payne (25). Mason took over after the Tigers' loss in Baton Rouge and took off from there. Mason ended the season with 1,816 rushing yards, (AU record) 23 touchdowns, (AU record) and a 5.7-yard per carry average. Mason moved on to the NFL and Auburn has a heap of talented runners in line to fill his shoes. The spring favorite will be senior Artis-Payne but redshirt freshman Peyton Barber is said to be the most talented back on the roster according to former teammate Mason and companion Artis-Payne. Barber has a bruiser style of running ability with a stout frame at 5'11 217 drawing comparisons to former Auburn running back Ben Tate. Speedster Corey Grant was third in rushing on the team last season with 647 rushing yards an a 9.8 average that ranked first in the country (unqualified). Freshman Roc Thomas (#6 rated RB) should see the field this season. This running attack will be once again be tough to stop for opposing defenses with a loaded running back corps with the addition of Marshall's running ability. I will call for at least two runners, including Marshall, to have 1,000-yard seasons and Peyton Barber will get the bulk of the carries.

Receivers: Auburn returns every wide receiver from the 2013 roster. Sammie Coates led the team with 42 receptions and 902 yards and a 21.5 average (third nationally). Ricardo Louis returns after having an inconsistent year but showed glimpses of what how he could impact the offense on every play. Sophomore Marcus Davis showed promise last season and Quan Bray returns for his senior season and will start in the slot. Newcomer D'haquille "Duke" Williams (talk of spring) will give Marshall a big-framed possession receiver. Williams has big play ability with spectacular hands. Look for Marshall's focus to shift from Coates to Williams in 2014. Jaylon Denson returns after suffering from a knee injury and plenty of depth is added with the additions of Stanton Truitt, Myron Burton, and redshirt freshman Dominic Walker. CJ Uzomah will line up at H-back and tight end with senior Brandon Fulse. With an experienced group and a great receivers coach Auburn should look crisper and should be more consistent. Too many drops in 2013.

Offensive Line: The offensive line was one of the most improved units on the 2013 team after an ugly showing in 2012. First round draft choice Greg Robinson was the anchor of the group and is the only starter Auburn must replace. In the projected starting five, Auburn has nearly 70 career starts not including the 36 starts by projected backup guard Chad Slade. This spring the Tigers' coaching staff moved 2013 starting right tackle Avery Young inside to right guard and Patrick Miller back at right tackle after starting the whole 2012 season. Shon Coleman (battled cancer successfully) has been highly talked about this spring with high praises from his teammates and looks to be the starter at left tackle. Coleman was a five star recruit in 2010. This line will continue to thrive in this offense and shouldn't miss a beat even with the departure of All-SEC offensive tackle Robinson.

Defensive Line: In Aubum's championship run in 2010 the Tigers had four players with at least seven tackles for loss, most notably Nick Fairley's 24. The Tigers had only one lineman with seven in 2012 (Angelo Blackson) but last season had two players with more than seven along with five with at least five tackles for loss. The Tigers ranked second in tackles for loss (90) in the SEC while also ranking third in team sacks (32). Dee Ford departs after showing his full potential in 2013 in his first full season. Ford led the team in sacks in 2012 (6) and last season with 10.5. Highly touted freshman Carl Lawson filled in nicely in Auburn's eight-man rotation finishing his rookie season with four sacks, 7.5 tackles for loss, and freshman All-America team honors. Lawson looks to fill the shoes of Ford with other highly touted recruit Elijah Daniel. The interior line is one of the more impressive units on the Auburn roster. Senior Gabe Wright and Ben Bradley anchor a solid defensive line with a bright future. Sophomore Montravius Adams is in the mold of another solid Auburn defensive tackle as he was just getting his feet wet in 2013. One of the 2012 starters, Jeffrey Whitaker, returns after receiving a medical redshirt in 2013. Freshmen ends Andrew Williams and Justin Thornton and tackles Dontavius Russell and Devonte Lambert have the potential to have an immediate impact like the freshman class last season. Auburn should improve on their poor rushing yards per game numbers (10th in SEC in 2013) and should stay near the top in the SEC in tackles for loss and sacks. Linebackers: The linebacking corps has been one of Auburn's weakest units in past seasons. Auburn returns five out

Linebackers: The linebacking corps has been one of Aubum's weakest units in past seasons. Aubum returns five out of its top six tacklers at the position not including the "star" position. Three-year starter Jake Holland departs after starting at middle linebacker for the past three seasons. Potential star Cassanova McKinzy moves from Will to Mike to fill the void of Holland and Kris Frost is on the other end of the switch finding a starting role at the weakside position. Justin Garrett was the talk of spring in 2013 but faced injuries throughout the season and now will move back to the outside after spending last spring at star. Consistency has been the big issue for this group in recent years and with Aubum only losing one starter the unit should improve and be more consistent and reliable in 2014.

4 Quan Bray (Sr. 5'10 196) 25 Trovon Reed (Sr. 6'0 190) Defensive Backs: The stats may not prove this statement, but the Auburn secondary showed strides of improvement last season. In 2010 and 2011 the Tigers ranked last in passing defense in the SEC followed by an eighth ranked passing defense in 2012. This was undoubtedly a group that needed improvement due to the inconsistent play resulting in poor numbers. The passing defense numbers in 2013 were identical to those of 2010, opponents completion percentage was much better (or worse, however you want to phrase it) at 58% as opposed to 63% in 2010. Free safety Jermaine Whitehead is the best of the group and started 27 games in the past three seasons. Strong safety Derrick Moncrief was a highly coveted JUCO recruit and will alternate with junior Joshua Holsey (ACL in 2013). Jonathon Mincy had a fine 2013 with 56 tackles and a team high 14 passes defended. The opposite of Mincy is the biggest question for the secondary. Jonathan Jones has shown potential the past two seasons, but senior Trovon Reed moved from receiver to cornerback to possibly replace the void left by the departed Chris Davis. The unit as a whole is not as experienced as it was in 2013, but still should be better. In 2007 and 2008 the Auburn defensive pass numbers were at an all-time low at 179 and 173 yards per game. I am not saying Aubum will get that low, but the numbers should improve and we should see an all-around higher level of play from the unit as a whole.

SPECIAL TEAMS POSITION WRITE-UP

Special teams have been a strength of Auburn's even in 2012 when the Tigers went 3-9. In 2012, Cody Parkey hit 11-14 field goals with a total of 60 points. Steven Clark led the team in punting with a 39.8 average with 15 kicks inside the twenty-yard line. Last season, the Tigers had one of their best units in years with solid numbers and game-changing abilities. Cody Parkey was solid hitting 15-21 field goals and an astounding 69 touchbacks (70% of his kickoffs)! Steven Clark has a 42.6 average and the team net was 40.5! Clark was surprisingly not a finalist for the Ray Guy Award after top-notch performances in the final four games. The returning game as a whole was much better with the return numbers (kick & punt combined) increasing from 15.6 average per return to 17.5 per return. The unit scored four touchdowns in 2013 with the most publicized "Kick Six" being the last. This unit has to replace ALL four primary starters. Redshirt freshmen Daniel Carlson and Jimmy Hutchinson will pick up the kicking duties with no experience in previous seasons. Quan Bray and Corey Grant will continue to handle the kickoff duties, but the punt returner is still in question. Obviously, this unit will be demoted in every aspect, but will gain valuable experience for the future. Aubum relied heavily on this unit in 2013, with Parkey, Clark, Mason, and Davis all making significant impacts.

COACHING STAFF WRITE-UP



Gus Malzahn spent six seasons as a division one offensive coordinator jumping straight to Arkansas right out of his high school coaching stint. Malzahn then found success at Tulsa averaging 44.1 points per game. while averaging over 550 total yards per gamein his two years there as offensive coordinator. Tulsa went to back-to-back Conference USA championships in Malzahn's short stay. First year Auburn coach, Gene Chizik, hired Malzahn to run his offense in 2009. Auburn went from 17.3 points per game and 302 yards per game in 2008 to 33.3 yards per game and 431 yards per game in 2009. Malzahn then left for Arkansas State after a coaching vacancy, then returned to The Plains when the job opened again. Malzahn once again improved the Auburn offense in 2013 with help from offensive coordinator Rhett Lashlee. Lashlee has been Malzahn's right hand man since his playing days at Shiloh Christian where Malzahn coached high school. Defensive coordinator Ellis Johnson came over from an unsuccessful one year as head coach at Southern Miss to become Auburn defensive coordinator. Johnson is still incorporating his unique 4-2-5 defensive scheme. Rodney Garner has been very successful in improving the defensive line play and has been solid on the recruiting trail. Dameyune Craig has done well with the receivers and has a great group returning in 2014. Auburn has one of the best staffs in the nation!

2014 OUTLOOK

Auburn had the worst season in school history in 2012 with a 3-9 (0-8) record and all-time season yardage lows. Shortly after the Iron Bowl, Gene Chizik was shown the door. Gus Malzahn was the next man in with just one season as a college head coach at Arkansas State. As said in the previous article, Malzahn transformed the very poor offensive numbers of 2012 to national highs in 2013. The Tigers improved from thee wins to 12 with an SEC championship and a trip to the national championship game falling short to Florida State in :13 seconds. The 2014 team is hungry to get back to capture another SEC title (will be fourth in ten years) and is even more hungry to take a stab at the new college playoff and get back to the national title game. This is a very seasoned group with very few positions that lack depth and need help. The defensive line is a definite strength with the best depth in the SEC and the offensive line is also another group with great talent. The biggest concern for Auburn, roster wise, is special teams as already mentioned. A couple of highly recruited kickers will fill the vacancies and will be relied on as soon as the first second rolls off in the opening game. The schedule is tough for the Tigers with road games at Kansas State, Ole Miss, Georgia, and Alabama, but this is the strongest and most talented team Auburn has had since winning the title in 2010.

Recruiting Breakdown

Overview: The Tigers stressed defense in this year's recruiting class signing 14 defensive players highlighted by five-star inside linebacker Tre' Williams. Many across the state and nation thought local five-star linebacker Rashaan Evans would choose the Tigers, but Evans had other plans as he signed with rival Alabama. The loss was crushing for the staff and fans, but signing JUCO Derrick Moncrief to play "star" or strong safety eased some of the pain as the 6'3 225 hybrid is almost guaranteed a starting role in the fall. Auburn added two immediate weapons to the already explosive offense signing five star JUCO wide receiver D'haquille Williams and an Under Armour All-American running back Roc Thomas. Williams has the potential to be an immediate star with his tremendous athleticism along with great hands and ability to create plays after the catch. The Tigers went heavy in the defensive backfield signing six secondary players. Kalvarez Bessent, Stephen Roberts, and Nick Ruffin were all participants in high school allstar games. All three look to make an impact this fall along with the late JUCO addition Joseph Turner. The class was predominantly focused on defense, but the Tigers still managed to grab top prospects that fit Malzahn's spread offense and overall this class was one of the better classes in the nation based on filling team needs.

Class Grade: B+ // A solid class as a whole and filled every team need across the board. Missing out on local talent Rashaan Evans knocked Auburn from an A to a B thinking it was almost a no-brainer signing.

2014 Needs: The one unit Auburn did not hit on this year's recruiting trail was the offensive line, even though the Tigers managed to sign two. Auburn will only lose three linemen next season, but offensive line is never a position in which a team should lack depth. Continuing to build depth in the linebacker unit will also need to be stressed along with some playmakers in the return game.
