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## NFC EAST



Dallas Cowboys
RB - DT - OLB - S - CB
The offseason is surrounded by the loss of DeMarco Murray, so Dallas will need to fill immediately. Secondary help is much needed.

## New York Giants

OG - OT - LB - S - CB
The offensive line has been rough as of late, so don't be surprised if the Giants go with the unsexy pick at no. 9. Defense needs depth.

Philadelphia Eagles
WR - OG - DE - OLB - S
Adding cornerback help in free agency was huge! Losing Maclin hurts; first round possibility for a new target. Lack a big-time pass rusher.

Washington Redskins $\quad$ QB $-\mathbf{R T}-\mathrm{OL}-\mathrm{LB}-\mathrm{S}$
This may be the last year to the short RG3 era, so his replacement is out there somewhere. The offensive line is filled with holes to fill (upgrade).

## Chicago Bears

QB - WR - NT - ILB - CB
Cutler is on his way out soon, so adding a new face could be addressed. Paea wasn't phenomenal, but enough to leave a big hole at nose tackle.

## Detroit Lions

$\mathrm{RB}-\mathrm{OG}$ - RT - DT - CB
An effective running game would add a new element to this offense. Improving the o-line would be nice. Lost a lot of talent across d-line.

Green Bay Packers
NT - DL - OLB - ILB - SS
Green Bay cut two inside linebackers this offseason knowing they must find the next guys this offseason. Clinton-Dix needs a partner at safety.

Minnesota Vikings
$\mathbf{R B}$ - WR - OL - ILB - CB
Xavier Rhodes has played great, but needs a buddy at corner. The offensive line is bumpy and needs to protect the young quarterback.

## Atlanta Falcons

RB - WR - OG - OLB - DB
Atlanta hasn't had a steady running game since letting go Michael Turner and the draft has many options in this year's class in every round.

Carolina Panthers
RB - WR - OT - S - LB
Cam was beat up all last season, so a pair of sturdy tackles should be the primary goal. Some key targets in the passing game would also be nice.

New Orleans Saints
QB - WR - TE - OLB - S
Since dealing Graham a vacancy opened up at tight end. Other options in the air would be great additions. An extra pass rusher is needed.

## Tampa Bay Buccaneers <br> $\mathrm{QB}-\mathrm{OG}-\mathrm{OT}-\mathrm{DE}-\mathrm{S}$ <br> McCown-out. Glennon-not the answer. Number one pick-?. Whomever the quarterback, some holes will need to be filled upfront for protection.

Arizona Cardinals
RB - WR - OG - S - CB
Some effective weapons on offense are needed, especially with lackluster quarterback play, which could be another position of need.

## St. Louis Rams

WR - OG - OT - C - DB The Rams need a number one receiver to help out Nick Foles. The offensive line is sporadic and it wouldn't hurt to add some new pieces.

San Francisco 49ers
RB - TE - DE - OLB - ILB
The domino effect took place in San Francisco this offseason, losing one player after the other. Linebackers are the biggest pressing need.

Seattle Seahawks
WR - OG - C - DL - OLB
Some consistent and effective wideouts for Russell Wilson would be fun to watch. Adding some beef up front on both sides should be considered.


Buffalo Bills
QB - OT - OL - ILB - FS
Manuel wasn't the answer and you know Rex Ryan wants to bring in some new talent. The offensive line is still inconsistent across the board.

Miami Dolphins
WR - OG - DT - LB - S Can Jarvis Landry be a true No. 1 receiver? The Dolphins gave up the tenth most sacks a year ago, so some help should be provided there.

New England Patriots
WR - OG - DT - LB - CB
Adding a top receiver would only be a luxury for Brady. The defense has some holes to fill upfront and for long-term purposes on the back-end.

New York Jets
QB - RB - ILB - OLB - DB
The quarterback class isn't deep enough if New York can't land Winston or Mariota early. Need some playmakers on defense to add to Revis.

## AFC NORTH



Baltimore Ravens
QB - WR - TE - DE - CB
Baltimore will need to add some weapons that Flacco can throw to at both tight end and wideout. The secondary had many SOS moments..

## Cincinnati Bengals <br> WR - OL - DT - S - CB <br> A playmaker out wide that can compliment Green would be great to add Need an upgrade at defensive tackle and some depth in the secondary.

## Cleveland Browns

QB - WR - TE - DE - NT It's your call on the quarterback situation. Josh Gordon can't stay on the field, so adding a playmaker on offense would be nice. Need pass rush.

Pittsburgh Steelers
QB - OT - OLB - S - CB
The ageless secondary has come and gone. Pittsburgh should address the secondary needs early. Adding depth on the o-line is always necessary.

## AFC SOUTH



Houston Texans
WR - C - OT - ILB - OLB Hopkins is the only go-to wideout on the roster so adding more weapons is likely. Linebacker and offensive line depth should also be addressed.

## Indianapolis Colts

C - RT - DE - ILB - S
The offensive line was a bit inconsistent in 2014 and Harrison may not be the long-term answer at center. Defense needs to take the next step.

Jacksonville Jaguars
RB - WR - OT - LB - FS
Jaguars gave up the most sacks in the NFL in 2014. Joeckel is fine, but more pieces are needed. A safety to partner with Cyprien would be great.

## Tennessee Titans

$\mathrm{QB}-\mathrm{OG}-\mathrm{RT}-\mathrm{DB}-\mathrm{LB}$
It's your call on the quarterback. Some added depth on the o-line would be good along with some key contributors on back end of the defense.

## AFC WEST



Denver Broncos
WR - C - OT - DT - K
Thomas was tagged, so a potential replacement will be needed. Center has been a need the past few seasons. D-line has some holes to fill

## Kansas City Chiefs

WR - OT - C - ILB - CB
You know the receiving woes (or QB woes) in 2014 and that will need to be fixed immediately. Inside linebackers need to be upgraded.

## Oakland Raiders

WR - TE - OT - DE - CB
Maybe Derek Carr can get a first round weapon unlike his brother received in Houston. Raiders were 31 ${ }^{\text {st }}$ in sacks forced in 2014.

## San Diego Chargers

$\mathrm{QB}-\mathrm{RB}-\mathrm{C}-\mathrm{NT}-\mathrm{OLB}$
An immediate talent at running back is needed (possible first round choice). Need some help on the d-line with a poor rush defense in 2014.


I'm a sucker for versatile defensive linemen and Williams has the total package with that. A superior block with win physical tools and the ability to shed blocks with active hands and an unmovable body. A great athlete for his size with the ability to bull rush from the outside while also being a dominant run $\overline{\text { cis }}$ defender inside. Extremely powerful. Elite vision.

## LEONARD WILLLAMS

DT/DE - USC - 6'5 - 303 - 4.97 - FIRST ROUND

COMPARABLE TO: Muhammad Wikerson, Jets

Little to no major flaws but had a bad habit of getting too upright off the snap virtually eliminating himself from being any major factor on the play. Being a tall lineman, he tends to battle with leverage. Doesn't possess any intimidating rush moves off the edge $亏$ relying more on physical traits and tools over skill. Gets in passing lanes, but rarely bats down passes.

A versatile dominant lineman, Williams is an elite prospect oozing with All-Pro traits. Being that he can line up in an odd or even set Williams is ready to go once his name is called. Williams is an unblockable talent that dominated college football for three years versus every level of competition. His combination of size, speed, and athleticism is salivating. Top 3 pick.

## JAMEIS WINSTON

26-1 as a starter. Has the physical tools to excel at the next level with a big athletic frame, good pocket mobility, and a strong arm to deliver strikes downfield. Works well through his progressions and throws well on the run. Gets the ball out quickly and is generally a good decision maker. Dominated operating in a pro-style offense. Clutch. COMPARABLE TO: Phillip Rivers, Chargers

## Constant non-football related issues that showed

 no growth in maturity off the field throughout his college career. Started off slow in many games in 2014. Interceptions increased by eight and QB rating dropped 39.3 points from freshman to sophomore season. Displayed many off-balanced $\geqslant$ throws in 2014 resulting in multiple interceptions.Immaturities aside, Winston is the most complete QB in the draft since Luck. He jumps off tape with superb physical tools. He possesses a rare skill set that scouts dream of with natural instincts, pocket awareness, a strong arm, and athleticism. Will have to answer questions about off the field issues, but is an elite talent on the field regardless.

WR - ALABAMA - 6'1 - 211 - 4.45 - FIRST ROUND COMPARABLE TO: Roddy White, Falcons

One of the better route runners in this class. Was consistently effective in every game in college. Ran a very diverse route tree lining up at every wideout position including the slot. Only slightly over $6^{\prime} 0^{\prime \prime}$, but effectively high points the football with soft but big 10inch hands. Accelerates well underneath and over the top. Highly effective after the catch. A+ work ethic.

Dealt with some series of drops in the 2014 season. He is a very crisp and solid route runner, $\geq$ but sometimes manages to stop routes. He doesn't have the desired height, but I am just being picky because neither does Jeremy Maclin, Antonio Brown, and Odell Beckham, Jr. but they are all just $\sum$ fine as number one receivers.

One of the better at tracking the ball and not giving away the ball to defenders. Great mixture of size and speed. A huge catch radius with 33.25 arms and snatches the ball out of the air high pointing the football. Can be very dangerous after the catch with the ability to dodge arm tackles and would-be $\frac{5}{3}$ tacklers. Best red-zone target in the draft.

Being a long strider, Parker doesn't gain separation on straight-line speed and by not having any quick sudden moves to break away. Battled to stay on the field during college with a foot injury and his speed hasn't been the same since returning. Though being a big receiver, he struggles to win battles off the line in press coverage

Cooper is the complete package at wide receiver with good speed and physical tools to be a potential red-zone target. Cooper draws immediate attention to opposing defenses being an elite talent. Some will view him as a low ceiling guy, but what you're getting now is still pretty darn spectacular. Don't let his calm demeanor fool you.

His ability to snag the ball out of the air with a large catch radius and the ability to be a key factor in the red-zone makes him an intriguing and elite prospect. His strength isn't running by defenders, but will catch anything within a mile and will win every contested ball. The sure-handed receiver (credited with only 3 drops since 2013) is a quarterback's dream go-to-guy.

## COMPARABLE TO: Julio Jones, Falcons

Very productive in 2014 breaking out with eyepopping performances in big games. Seen as a straight-line speed guy in a high-powered offense, but has physical traits to trump the opposition. Very quick and twitchy off the line blowing by corners within the first few steps. High points the football with big hands and great leaping ability.

Didn't have a very diverse route tree in college, but made the most of it. When not getting the initial edge off the line (could make an argument that he relies too much on physical ability), he can struggle gaining separation though running a 4.35 at the combine. Can be clumsy in footwork running $>$ with feet inward (pigeon-toed).

Some may hit him as a possible one-hit wonder, but White had the same ability in 2013, but just became more effective for the Mountaineer offense in 2014. His combination of size and speed with natural hands makes coaches drool. He will need to be polished in a few areas, but may have the most upside of any prospect in this class.

## DANNY SIFLITON

DT - WASHINGTON - 6'2-339-5.64-FIRST ROUND

Big man with the motor and intensity to give $100 \%$ on every play (virtually played every snap for岸 Huskies). Though being inked as strictly a nose tackle, he has finesse traits being a superb run stuffer and can be an effective pass rusher. Can play on all downs. Extremely athletic being able to $\frac{\rightharpoonup_{5}^{x}}{3}$ bend well and display nice agility. A+ strength.

Has the ability to be an effective pass rusher, but the 2014 stats can be deceiving as many of the z sacks came against inferior opponents. Banks strictly off physical ability and powerful strength (most nose tackles do) though not displaying many dominant moves. Seesawed weight in college; $\sum^{2}$ something that will be monitored at the next level.

You have to be very picky if you want to find flaws in Shelton's overall game as he displays nice athleticism for his size, very aware of his surroundings (can struggle with cut blocks sometimes) and brings a competitive edge each play. His pure-power and elite effort in pursuit makes Shelton a fun prospect to watch on film.

## DANTE FOWIER, JR.

DE/OLB - FLORIDA - 6'2 - 261 - 4.60 - FIRST ROUND


Many times would over-pursue on tape when playing the "buck" with ball carriers sliding right by him. Not an extremely strong lower body seeing some tackles result in him getting knocked back before finishing the play. A bit of a mess sometimes when rushing the passer trying to do $\geqslant$ too much, so needs some work with technique.

Whether lining up at outside linebacker or defensive end, Fowler has a knack at getting to the quarterback. He has a combination of moves, though not all perfected, with a powerful and explosive first move to give him an advantage off the snap. His versatility will only help him make that step while continuing to get stronger. Exciting.


Does everything well. Can be shifty and powerful when need be while also being a homerun hitter in both the run game and the return game. Tremendous strength and will not get slowed down by arm tackles. North and south runner that rarely had negative plays in college. Reliable receiver Had only three fumbles in career on 510 carries. COMPARABLE TO: Marshawn Lynch, Seahawks First Round Grade

Obviously dealt with multiple injuries in college most notably the recent ACL injury in October of 2014. Only completed one full season due to either injury or suspension (played only $40 \%$ of offensive snaps over three seasons). Not an excellent pass protector. Concerns are real about coming back to $\geqslant$ full-speed whenever he makes his return.

When healthy, Gurley was the best player in college football and if healthy, many could make a case as ranking him as the top prospect in the draft. Gurley has a rare combination of power and speed with amazing balance with control as a runner. If his injury report checks out, Gurley could be a potential "steal" on the 2015 NFL Draft.

## BRANDON SCHERFF

Displays the ability to penetrate and create disruption at the line and in the backfield. Will do
Powerful and effective blocker with insane strength throughout his frame. Fairly good athlete for his size that has good enough lateral quickness in the run game. A punishing blocker with a mean streak and plays hard until the whistle. Smart cerebral lineman that can read defenses and excels at picking up blitzes and extra pass rushers. whatever it takes to get the ball carrier while keeping eyes up with good play recognition skills. Shows quickness off the snap with power at the point of attack. Very well grounded and mature raising a family of his own.


OWA - 6'4 - $319-5.05$ - FIRST ROUND COMPARABLE TO: David DeCastro, Steelers


#### Abstract

Can rely too much on upper body strength, therefore losing leverage and balance in pass protection. Doesn't recover very well and isn't extremely quick picking up pass rushers off the edge, therefore projecting more as a guard. Many times got pushed around on bull rushers and gave $\sum_{\sum}^{\infty}$ too many opportunities for rusher to make a play.


Scherff is a dominating run blocker with mean streak tendencies to pancake every potential on looker in the backfield. His style of play doesn't project as a tackle to the next level similarly to Zack Martin a year ago. Scherff has many atributes and abilities to excel at the next level with All-Pro potential as an interior lineman.

Doesn't have much of a collection of certain pass rush moves relying mostly on effort and power to get pas the line (which isn't always a bad thing). Motor can run hot and cold once being doubleteamed or not getting by on primary moves after $\lambda_{\Sigma}$ the snap. Not as powerful as you would hope.

Brown is a hard worker that is effective when giving $100 \%$. He struggles the most when doubleteamed in trying to find ways to get out of the situation. Brown displays many things to like including flexibility, initial penetration, and the play recognition. Brown has a nice ceiling of potential if selected into scheme that fits his style.

COMPARABLE TO: Anthony Davis, 49ers

A dominating run blocker with a strong base and strong hands that cannot be moved. Powerful off the snap with the ability to control oncoming run defenders by driving them out of the way creating nice running lanes. Not a great pass protector, but can lock out the defender when making contact with good length and above average strength.

Isn't a quality pass blocking bookend especially on the left side. Sports a good enough base, but can battle with leverage issues allowing rushers to cut inside and get to the quarterback. Also concerning leverage, he tends to lunge forward too many times losing balance and effectiveness. Hand placement can be a mess in pass protection.

Collins is a dominating run blocker, but could use some technique work in pass protection. Either way Collins is a force at the point of attack driving defenders back eliminating them from the play. May project better as a guard being a good enough athlete with the ability to slide well and explode at the scene of action. Should be able to play right away at guard.

## RANDY GREGORY

DE/OLB - NEBRASKA -6'5-235-4.64-FIRST ROUND

A long athletic defender that can chase down ball carriers with adequate speed in pursuit. Even though

lean, shows good power and strength to take out opposing offensive tackles. Versatile across the line being able to rush the quarterback at every position occasionally dropping back in coverage. Extremely quick of the edge and fast with inside moves.


COMPARABLE TO: George Selvie, Giants
Not as explosive as you would expect. Doesn't have good first step quickness compared to other top edge rushers. Has difficult time in converting speed to power when not initially coming clean off the end. Fairly weak 㐍 lower frame that is exposed during run plays not being able to anchor down. Dealt with multiple marijuana $\sum_{\boldsymbol{\Sigma}}$ incidents in school, though admits to his faults.

With a nice mixture of size, length, and athleticism, Gregory has the elite potential to be a dominating 4-3 defensive end or a standup 3-4 outside linebacker in the NFL. Getting stronger throughout his lean body will be key for his success at the next level while continuing to stay grounded with recent drug related incidents.

Continued to get locked up by bigger and more mobile offensive tackles. Doesn't have a collection of pass rush moves. Not a desired length for the position of an outside pass rusher on the line. Lacks lower body strength and on film it hurts him in the run game.

Takes enough bad angles on run plays to count as something he needs to work on. Played at a very slim 220 lbs . at Clemson and it showed by not having that strength and power to anchor the edge.

Beasley is and should be viewed as a primary pass rusher as a 3-4 outside linebacker. From just a raw pass rushing point of view, Beasley is one of the best I have ever "scouted". He has the speed and explosive quickness off the snap to cause opposing offenses to run things to the opposite side. If in the right scheme, we could be looking at the player in the draft a few years from now.

Played 36 games and started 27. Mentally tough corner that thrives in man-to-man coverage


What ILIKE creating his own island. Great recovery speed shown on tape and at combine(4.31). Good tackler with some pop. Isn't afraid to come up and make a play in the run game. Makes every receiver work hard to get open with good length and leverage.

A massive prospect, Peat is a force at left tackle. He is a big powerful lineman that has superior strength and is light on his feet for his size with good agility. Peat has some technique issues he needs to work on, but looks to be a solid NFL contributor in his first season.

With a little polishing, Gordon has nice potential to become a potent back in the NFL.

## TRAE WAYNES

Yes, he highly contends with every receiver on every route, but can lose the battle due to his very lean body build and lacking ideal strength. In a league that is very pass interference happy, he will struggle in avoiding flags. Can fail to run end over end losing balance and could be viewed as clumsy on his feet. Allows too much cushion underneath.

Overall, Waynes should develop into a nice starter in the league for many years. His specialty is a bump and run type game that shows his closing speed and his ability to stay stride for stride with the nation's fastest receivers. Waynes plays extremely confident which is what you want in today's NFL. His biggest issue is being too grabby.
